Overall membership numbers remain ahead of where we were before the pandemic, which is encouraging and sailing participation is also strong.

As you will have seen from this year's report, Emma has done brilliantly keeping track of club expenditure, always ensuring we get the best value for money possible delivering the different projects and the day to day costs of keeping the club going.



A number of work parties have been held throughout the year, enabling us to come together to complete some bigger jobs, from a big tidy up of the top field, to spartina removal to filling of gabians. The adage of more hands make light work, very appropriate!

Projects interrupted by the lock downs were able to be picked up again, for sure Captain Andy has been busy, not only with the kitchen refurbishment completed and looking smart, it was also exciting to see the arrival of the Mini-tractor, adding to club resources and capabilities.







The Dee Cruiser fleet continues to go from strength to strength. To best share their adventures, I asked Class Captain Noel for his account of 2021.



Perhaps it was lockdown, with many sailors choosing not to holiday abroad, but 2021 saw a record number of cruisers launched from DSC. With more than 30 yachts swinging at the Thurstaston moorings by the end of May, the sailing season promised to be busy. And the promise was more than fulfilled.

Spring sailing started with 2 well attended Man-Over-Board training sessions, the Coronation Pursuit where yacht Atlas performed remarkably over 4 other boats and also the beginning of the 'To-Be-Named' series of races. In the series, yachts gained points both for completing and winning races. The winning boat would have the series and the trophy named after it at the end of the season. Captains were keen to have the new trophy named after their boats and many cruisers were attracted to start racing actively.

In June, racing paused briefly for Solstice cruising week which saw 2 flotillas set out. Five yachts headed for Anglesey and explored the Menai Straits past Caernarvon and beyond to Pilot's Cove. A smaller flotilla explored the Dee Estuary and surrounding waters with cruises to Rhyl, Llandudno, Llanerch-y-Mor and Hilbre.

Outside of Solstice week, cruising continued throughout the summer with return visits to Llanerch-y-Mor for the inaugural Fun Ship festival and numerous cruises to Talacre, Hilbre and Rhyl.









The Commodore's cruise on 3rd July was attended by over ten yachts and the long distance challenge race to D1 was won by Tarka.

The most tense races of the season occurred in June and August. June saw 8 yachts cross the start line for the DSC regatta which because of extremely gentle winds required captains to make use of every breath of wind to gain position. Finally, Baby Jane narrowly lifted the trophy after catching an offshore breeze as the finish line approached.



Conditions could hardly have been more different for the inaugural Chris Weston Memorial race in which strong south-westerly winds of over 20 knots saw boats fly around a three-point course at speeds of over 6 knots with the cup narrowly won by Wild Magic.





Sadly summer always comes to an end and, as the weather became more unsettled in late September, the finale of the 'To-be-Named' series had to be re-scheduled twice. However, the finale eventually went ahead on 26th September with 7 boats crossing the start with 4 boats still in the running for the trophy. Wild Magic completed a successful year's racing by crossing the line with both the fastest actual and adjusted time. However, she was only seconds ahead of Cordelia once handicaps were calculated. So, in tune with an exciting year's sailing the final race ended with a dramatic finish.

Once all boats were safely laid up in the boatyard in October, cruisers came together at DSC clubhouse for a laying up lunch to share stories and photos of the year.





The Dinghy and Catamaran fleets have had an active year as well, whether that's open meetings at Dee, inter-club racing, travelling to events, to more estuary escapades, overall participation has been encouraging.



Then Dee's annual Dart Open was held at the end of May, with 24 boats entering, 13 of which from Dee SC. Racing was fierce and the Goose was cold! In terms of results, James & Alison came out victorious, beating previous Nationals winners Rob Garca & Fi Goegebeur into second place. Then in the Handicap Prizes, Billy & Tom were winners, with Glen & Rosie second.

First up was the Blaze Northern Championships, this event was truly a testament to Blaze leader lan McLeans tenacity! After limited commitment in the run up to the event, a fleet of 7 Blazes & some Lasers took to the water, which included the introduction of some guy called Leroy Matthews to the Blaze fleet. Two days of racing ensued, with some lively conditions on the Saturday, followed by more light and shifty winds on the Sunday; competitors and the race team were kept on their toes! Well done to lan for making it happen.





Other particularly notable events included Chris Weston's Memorial day, a fitting tribute to a such a well loved Dee stalwart. Well done Pete & Max Spedding for winning the dinghy & catamaran racing.

We also had the regatta, which was great success; equally great to see Sam Newton & Christina Churchman coming out on top in the Dart fleet. It was also a great club social; a perfect Dee afternoon on the lawn, with the first live entertainment since before the pandemic – no one would have guessed???





This year the club was well represented on the national circuits, in particular was brilliant to see James & Alison winning the Bridlington Dart 18 TT; we also had members attend both the Blaze & Dart Nationals.





We were also represented in local competitions organised by kindred clubs, with entries in the Liverpool YC's Commodores Cup and WKSC's Match Racing competition.



One project that has been ongoing for a number of years has been to set the club up as a RYA training centre. The primary objective being to enable us to run our own Power Boat Courses, with the potential to lead on to other areas such as Day Skipper, VHF,.... Thanks to President James Douglas for his perseverance and kicking this over the line, with support from Jon Hayley, Andy Nash & Chris Hoppins. Exciting to see that we have 2 weekends of PB2 course coming up in March, both of which are fully subscribed and will hopefully help us to bolster our rescue team which is increasingly relying on fewer volunteers to provide support.











While we hadn't managed to coordinate diaries with WKSC, it was great to find Jean Louis on his Fin & Jon Atkinson with his cruiser had braved the elements to join us. For 2022, I'm confident that our dates are aligned with WKSC for the 11th June and we will hopefully be joined by our friends at Wallasey YC. This years Commodores Cruise took place on the 23rd July.

Another fairly grim morning met us at the club, however as the cruisers had already set off, we were all committed and off we went!

With support from our salty seadogs Glen & Gareth, the flotilla made it safely to the West Hoyle sandbank.





Fun was definitely had by all (even Gareth), the rain held off, we were treated to freshly caught mackerel off the BBQ and Dart joy rides were enjoyed by a number of the cruising fraternity.





I hope you have enjoyed this report and agree that 2021 has been another successful year for Dee SC, now set for what should be a great 2022. The sailing program has just been published, so look our for that, it should be cracking season all round!

Also as you will see in the AGM notice, there are relatively little changes to the make up of the General Committee this year. Although of course I will be stepping down after my 2 years, handing over the reigns to Andy Potter.

For those of you who don't know Andy, he's a hugely experienced sailor, regularly seen out blasting around the estuary on his A Class catamaran!
